We Are Only Shadows. Juan Ignacio García Garzón, in ABC, Madrid (3-10-2012)

"Before talking about the play target of this review, allow me a suggestion: if you love theatre in capital letters, do not, under any circumstances, miss it! I cannot recall any other approach to *Life is a Dream* where the lines of action and the trains of thought of the Calderonian drama are elucidated in such a deep, clear, touching and interesting way as in this one signed by Juan Mayorga, directed by Helena Pimenta, in her first work as head of the Compañía Nacional de Teatro Clásico, and stared by the formidable Blanca Portillo (....) It has delighted me and moved me both times I've seen it (....) Each of the staging elements conspire to achieve a greater play: the scenic design (...) the exquisite wardrobe (...) the prodigious lighting by Gómez Cornejo (...) Juan Mayorga's version, clear, concise, intense (...) and the wise, vehement and brilliant direction by Helena Pimenta, who maintains high-flying from the beginning to the end, always harmonising the general pulse and the specific detail. (...) Performances are the jewels in the crown, set in such a sovereign foundation. (...) Everything adds up in this complex, gripping, perfect performance".

"Helena Pimenta has started her career as head of the CNTC measuring her weapons with the classic play 'par excellence', La vida es sueño (Life is a Dream) (...) La vida es sueño (Life is a Dream) (...) has a very high standard of excellence and offers a lot to admire. For a start it is a terrific beginning of a road. And a high risk that is applauded, as choosing a title of this importance might be considered, at first sight, easy, when it is just the opposite (...) Pimenta has seized the best (great text, a team of the highest order, noble lure of the brilliant Blanca Portillo) in order to accomplish two aims, to bring people to the theatre and to convey the text as sharply as possible: clear direction, clear intentions, clear emotions (...)

The first thing we see is the impressive staging of Alejandro Andújar and Esmeralda Díaz. They wouldn't have been able to create those spaces and those images without the extraordinary and pictorial lighting of Gómez Cornejo in one of his best jobs: a true gift for the sight. (...) Four excellent musicians interpret pieces selected by Ignacio García: lovely. (...) It is hard to find words to describe the extraordinary performance of Blanca Portillo. Eloquence would be the most accurate term (...) It goes far beyond her beautiful voice and the perfection of her technique: she has something thaumaturgical, because he has such a power of conviction that she achieves the miracle of taking your breath away (...) The richness of her nuances and register is absolute: she elevates and performs a complete Segismundo, the most complete I've ever seen (...) La vida es sueño (Life is a Dream) is filling the Pavón. And it will fill more: time will tell".

"In the future, I'll be able to boast that I saw Blanca Portillo playing the role of Segismundo in «La vida es sueño» (Life is a Dream), by Calderón de la Barca; hers is, undoubtedly, one of the most wonderful performances that I have ever seen on stage. (...) On this staging, signed by Helena Pimenta, the masculinity of the character isn't avoided. But Blanca Portillo doesn't "pretend to be" a man, she doesn't strain her voice (she does work on it) nor does she try it with her gestures. It's her attitude, the subtlety of her movement and words, what gives credibility. As do the deepness in her diction, the serious and dramatic echo with which she tinges each monologue and dialogue, the fury in her sharp look and the vigour in her actions. Blanca isn't a man, nor is it necessary, but her Segismundo is, and a man that moves, frightens, impresses. (...) On a perfect version by Juan Mayorga (...) Helena Pimenta signs an impeccable show. The staging is practically bare, where sounds and images contribute to highlight the text, where every element favours the play and defines a piece full of magnetism and electricity. (...) Interpretations, brilliant and balanced, also have it; I specially liked Marta Poveda, moving, hurting and furious at the same time; Joaquín Notario, majestic; Fernando Sansegundo, full of compassion; and the funny David Lorente".
